Our Founding Father



Padmeshri Dr. Vitthalrao Vikhe Patil , the pioneer of Sugar Co-operative movement, who had a humble beginning, was chiefly instrumental in, organizing the much exploited sugarcane ‘growers of the 44 villages, in and around Pravaranagar, way back in 1948, and establishing Asia’s first co-operative sugar factory, which was commissioned in 1950. Born in a farmer’s family at Loni in 1901, he was distressed by the pitiable plight of the poor, the illiterate and the downtrodden peasantry who were exploited by the money-lenders, feudal lords, and private sugar factory owners. In those days the local peasantry of Pravara area had to face difficulties in marketing of sugarcane, as conversion of sugarcane into Sugar was totally uneconomical and the “Jaggery Prices, reached the rock bottom. Therefore, Padmeshri began exploring ways of uplifting the farmers of this area. It dawned on him that co-operative movement was the only ideal medium to achieve his goal. So begins the saga of co-operative movement in India. He pioneered co-operative movement as a tool for social, educational & economic upliftment of the rural masses. His untiring efforts changed the rural scene of Maharashtra & created awareness amongst the people to lead a prospective purposeful life. He was awarded “Padmeshree” the distinguished title in appreciation of his life’s work with the co-operative movement, at the hands of the President of India, Late. Dr. Rajendra Prasad in 1961. He was felicitated with the honorary D. Lit. Degree by University of Pune in 1978 and Doctor of Science in 1979 by Mahatma Phule Krishi Vidyapeeth, Rahuri.

College academic calendar includes plan for regular lectures, practical's, guest lectures, examinations, industry visits, alumni meet, parents meets etc. Course allotment is done based on preference given by teacher and considering their responsibility/other workload. Course time table, Laboratory time table, Individual time table is prepared and finalized. Course and laboratory time table is displayed on notice board and web-site to aware stakeholders before commencement of semester. Course file is prepared for each course by respective teachers and approved by academic incharge and principal. Based on blooms taxonomy teaching and practical plans are prepared for each course as per course time table which are mapped with course outcome and program outcome. Teaching plan and practical plan are checked and approved by academic in charge and Principal for each course. Based on academic details college prepares academic book which include vision, mission, course objectives, course outcomes, program outcomes, program specific outcomes, program education outcomes, evaluation guidelines, teaching plans, assignments, demo sessional papers, question bank, university semester question papers mapped with course outcome, programme outcome and Blooms taxonomy. The copy of academic book is kept in library for reference of the students.

Curriculum delivery is done by using conventional method, power point presentation, seminars, workshops, conferences, guest lectures, industrial visits, software's etc.

In practical teachers explain the relevance of theoretically learned concepts with the experiment. A review of key points is delivered prior to experiment and performance. Teacher demonstrates the experiment and latter student performs the practical.

Principal and academic incharge takes regular review of syllabus completion through academic progress reports in staff meeting.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

College is responsible for creating safe and structured learning environments that will promote the goals for student learning. Codes of conduct can clarify an organization's mission and values. This Code provides information to parents and students regarding standards of conduct, consequences of misconduct, and procedures for administering discipline. We expect the students to abide by the code of conduct given below:

1. A six day working schedule from Monday to Saturday is followed. Classes are scheduled from 9.30 a.m. to 5.15 p.m. The first period will begin after National Anthem which will be played through P.A System.
2. Students are expected to treat all members of the college community with honour, respect and courtesy
3. Students are expected to switch off the lights, fans and other electric equipments/gadgets when not in use.
4. No student shall enter or leave the class room when the session is on without the permission of the teacher concerned.
5. All leave applications (Regular & Medical) shall be submitted in time, for sanction by concerned teachers. Application for medical leave shall be accompanied by valid medical certificates.

6. If any Resident has to go to the town for any work, He must fill the out Pass form and make an entry in the register with security guard on duty.
7. In case of Medical issues, Resident should communicate to warden. Also inmate the same to his buddy friend inform about their friend's illness to the warden.
8. Visitors may meet Resident student outside the gate of Residents' Hostel up to 7:00pm with the permission of Asst. Rector / warden.
9. Any complaints or suggestion by the students must be communicated to Asst. Rector through respective

10. Resident s will be liable to penalty for any damage of hostel Property singly or collectively.
